# Guest Speaker, Susan Gustin, Colorado National History Day

Susan Gustin was our guest speaker today speaking on National History Day. Susan is the Assistant State Coordinator and a former engineer and recruiter for Chevron Oil Company. She has a master's degree with an emphasis on recent U.S. and British history, and is particularly interested in the history of World Wars 1914-1945.

Colorado participates in the national history day, which challenges students to develop research projects on historical subjects using primary

sources. This is a yearlong program involving students in the 6<sup>th</sup> through 12<sup>th</sup> grade producing presentations in a variety of formats, including papers, exhibits, documentaries, performances, and web sites. The theme for 2008 is, *Conflict and Compromise in History*.

Judges and volunteers are needed for this project, which is May 3<sup>rd</sup> at the University of Colorado, Denver Aurora Campus. Judges and volunteers will receive a Jefferson Peace Medallion for their participation in the project. Seven hours are involved, two in training and five at the actual event. Judges need plenty of "common sense" and a willingness to affirm the participants as very knowledgeable on their subject. Get sign-up sheets from **Greg Young**. # Why Leap Years Are Used February 29, 2008

The year 2008 is a leap year. If you look at a 2008 calendar, you will see that February has five Fridays-the month begins and ends on a Friday. Between the years 1904 and 2096, leap years that share the same day of week for each date repeat only every 28 years. The most recent year in which February comprised five Fridays was in 1980, and the next occurrence will be in 2036.

#### What is a leap year?

A leap year is a year in which one extra day has been inserted, or intercalated, at the end of February. A leap year consists of 366 days, whereas other years, called common years, have 365 days.

#### Which years are leap years?

In the Gregorian calendar, the calendar used by most modern countries, the following three criteria determine which years will be leap years:

- 1. every year that is divisible by four is a leap year;
- 2. of those years, if it can be divided by 100, it is NOT a leap year, unless
- 3. the year is divisible by 400. Then it is a leap year.

According to the above criterion, that means that years 1800, 1900, 2100, 2200, 2300 and 2500 are NOT leap years, while year 2000 and 2400 are leap years.

It is interesting to note that 2000 was somewhat special as it was the first instance when the third criterion was used in most parts of the world.

In the Julian calendar-introduced by Julius Caesar in 46 BC and patterned after the Roman calendar-there was only one rule: any year divisible by four would be a leap year. This calendar was used before the Gregorian calendar was adopted.

#### Why are leap years needed?
