Mike McMahon introduces our speaker this morning. Stephanie Villafuerte, Esq. is the Executive Director of the Rocky Mountain Children's Law Center (CLC). She commends the assembled group on the energy this morning and begins to tell the story of this group. For over thirty years, the Children's Law Center has dedicated itself to advocating for Colorado's abused and neglected children.

The CLC's mission is to "transform the lives of abused, neglected and at-risk children through compassionate legal advocacy, education and public policy reform."



Stephanie begins with the story of Samantha, 6 months old who died in November of 2014. After being called for a child that was unresponsive

authorities questioned the father after efforts to revive her failed. His story was inconsistent with the injuries that caused her death and he eventually confessed to causing her severe head injuries after her cries became irritating to him. As terrible as the crime of her death was, even more egregious were the sentence of probation and mandatory parenting classes the father received. The Children's Law Center seeks to protect and speak for those too young to protect and speak for themselves.

Each year social services receive over 80,000 calls of neglect or abuse of children. Of these, roughly half are

Persistent Oss shares, "Stephanie Villafuerte gave us a very enlightening presentation. We spoke about the Tamarac club. I sent a note over to their president, Nancy DeNiro and to the Denver Tech Center Optimist president Trish Merrill. prosecuted, and of those, 10,000 children are removed from their home. The Children's Law Center works on the three "Ptheory": PREVENT, PROTECT, and PREPARE.

The best way to protect children is <u>To PREVENT</u> abuse from occurring in the first place. The group works to implement public policy and appellate programs to create legislation and standards to assist in preventing child abuse. <u>To PROTECT</u> the 10,000 children who have been removed from their homes, CLC works to make sure they get the services they deserve to heal

from the trauma they have suffered. In addition, <u>To PRE-PARE</u> the children for life after abuse that has occurred. The group's specialists work to give children the childhoods they deserve by finding resources for extracurricular activities, educational service, and needed life skills

Thousands of children need help each year; the Children's Law Center receives funding from legal services they provide, from Grants and donations, and from special events. Please consider supporting this group as they perform this vital service for the neglected and abused children of our State.
