# Speaker, Steve Wooton


In the 1980's the Department of Defense created the 235,000 acre Piñon Canyon Maneuver Site (PCMS) in the largest condemnation of private property in US history. Today, they propose to expand the PCMS by up to seven million acres, as evidenced by an Army planning map released through the Freedom of Information Act.

The proposed expansion would destroy an intact, living landscape intricately woven together by ecology, history and culture. The area's short-grass prairie ecosystem is inextricably linked with a sustainable human agricultural economy. The proposed expansion would displace a culture, turn living history into dead static history, and litter a wild fragile landscape with tank tracks and live fire munitions debris.

PCEOC and other opponents of the PCMS expansion are a diverse group of patriotic people from all walks of life, who share the common goal of preventing the Pentagon from destroying the land and the lives of Southeastern Colorado.

They fully support our men and women in uniform and the need for adequate training to maintain a strong military. However, they firmly disagree with the DOD's plan to acquire additional land amounting to an area larger than the state of Connecticut. They believe it is unnecessary and wrong, especially considering that the DOD already has 25 million acres at its disposal. They ask all citizens to help encourage legislators to rein in the DOD, and hold them accountable.
