Our Speaker Today - Ben Lewis Mile High United Way

Tom Mauro introduces our speaker this morning. Standing in for our scheduled invitee, Lindsey Morgan Tracy, from United Way was Ben Lewis, United Way's Senior Director, Donor Relations.

Ben is a longtime volunteer and now a director for United Way, dating back to his time with United Bank of Denver. United Bank enrolled Ben in the "Loaned Executive" program and he spent three months working on various projects. It was this experience that Ben recounts, that introduced him to the great work this organization does for our community. Ben is here today to talk specifically about the Childhood Literacy

program being implemented by United Way in Colorado. A troubling statistic for our city; Denver Public Schools has a 51% high school graduation rate. The United Way is hoping to address this issue with a grant from the Social Innovation Fund. This program identifies the most promising, results oriented non-profit pro-

grams and looks to expand their reach throughout the country. Of the five grants that were awarded around the United States, United Way in Colorado received an award and targeted 3rd Grade Literacy as its focus. They seek to do this by funding existing programs that have been depleted through budget cuts and diminished funding. Many libraries in our state have had to reduce their hours and close entirely for parts of the week.

Schools and cities have to submit detailed plans for monies that are awarded and follow up documentation that support the implementation of the programs. Studies show that 30% of third graders are not reading at grade level. Of low income families, that statistic rises to 83% of children not able to read proficiently. These are due to a variety of factors, but the aim is to reduce these numbers and give children the tools and skills to become good readers and better students. Educating children and helping them succeed in school is a great idea and program that we can all support. See more on the United Way website at <http://www.unitedwaydenver.org/>.

Last year Mile High United Way's School Readiness Initiative helped 44,000 young children receive quality early childhood education.
