OCMS Respect For Law Presentation

The Respect For Law program dates to its beginnings in July 1965, when a discussion between Past Optimist International President **Carl Bowen** and former FBI Director J. Edgar Hoover resulted in the birth of the Respect for Law program. This is the fourth most popular program with more than 1,500 Clubs participating last year.

Recognized for this year's award were the three High School Resource Officers from DPD District 3. They were South High School's Technician, Ryan Barnes; Thomas Jefferson's HS's Technician, Tim Cueva; and George Washington HS's Technician, Phillip Mitchell.

The Denver Police High School Resource Officers have a complex and diverse assignment requiring numerous talents and skills. They often employ counseling and mentoring skills to students within the school. Additionally, they provide advice and act as a positive role model which makes them an invaluable liaison for both their department and for our schools.

Their constant contact and involvement with students often in a non-threatening circumstance, builds bridges between the police department and the entire community they serve. They frequently become involved in school activities which extends well beyond the role of a police officer.

We at the Optimist Club of Monaco South are proud of our High School Resource Officers and view them as a tre-


Great West Life Bike MS Bicycle Ride: The ride will be this June 25th and 26th. Organizer Robert Wardlaw passed

Bill Walters Presentation

Joining us as our speaker was none other than our very own and special past president Bill Walters. Bill came to address the crowd and reflect on the events of his life once his Leukemia was diagnosed around Christmas time.

It all started when Bill visited his doctor because he was developing a cold. Three days and four doctors later, he received the call at 7 PM that changed his life. He was diagnosed with Leukemia, and his head went into a spin as his

Odyssey began....

He checked into a hospital the next day and stayed there for three months. Bill endured three rounds of chemotherapy to battle his disease in an effort to get his blood counts to a level that would facilitate a bone marrow transplant from his brother John. After his final round of chemotherapy, Bill

was given the devastating news: his counts were not at the level necessary for a transplant and that the doctors can't go any further with the chemotherapy. He was told, "We'll have to let you just live your life the way you want to."

The shock would strike an ordinary man down. Yes. Bill was upset initially, but with his resolve, his daughter, his family, and support from all, he now has hope with alternative medicines, starting with acupuncture on Monday and then a visit with a nutritionist.

Bill's brother John from Chicago is a Deacon. He was asked to share two poignant stories with the group. One was regarding that we are Children of God, and the other was about their sister's life being lost to cancer three years ago. As John put it so well, "Sometimes life just kicks you in the head...." It became very obvious that John is a great source of inspiration and support for Bill.

In closing, Bill said, "Thanks a million. 'Cause I didn't come to say good bye, I came to say that I'll be back. And I appreciate all the support that everybody's given me. That's why I believe that Monaco South is so strong, and it's the
