#### Some Curious Things You Might Not Know About Colorado

<u>Highest Climb</u>. The highest vertical climb is not on a mountain but up the north side of the Black Canyon. Rising 1,700 feet, this sheer rock face is even higher than the famous Diamond on Longs Peak and was not conquered until 1969.

<u>Deepest Snow</u>. In 1899 Crested Butte recorded 254 inches of snow near the top of Kebler Pass. That year, snow buried a train near Leadville and left only stove pipes showing above cabins at many mountain towns. Usually, Wolf Creek Pass near Pagosa Springs gets the most snow in Colorado.

<u>Oldest Hotel</u>. The Peck House in the little town of Empire, near Berthoud Pass, is Colorado's oldest hotel. It was built in 1859 by James Peck. Early guests included President Ulysses S. Grant and other famous people.

<u>Highest Town</u>. Leadville is the highest (10,200 feet) incorporated town in Colorado and the entire U.S. It has also had the highest rate of premature babies in the U.S. Researchers concluded that the altitude causes smaller babies.

Largest Nuggets. The biggest gold nugget in Colorado weighed 135 ounces and was found near Breckenridge in 1887 by miner Tom Broves. The biggest silver nugget weighed 1,840 pounds and was found at an Aspen mine in 1894.

Largest Elk Antlers. Measuring 52" at the widest point, the antlers of an elk killed in 1899 near Crested Butte are still on display at that town's visitor center. In 1961, Boone and Crockett researchers declared it to be the largest elk rack in history.



#### Joe Marci, Bob Meyer and Ron Cisco Update on CO-WY District Junior Golf Program

Our speakers today were our own **Joe Marci**, **Bob Meyer** and **Ron Cisco**, with an update on the Colorado-Wyoming District Optimist Junior Golf Program. Bob gave us a rundown on two upcoming qualifi-



ers. The first will be Saturday, June 11<sup>th</sup> at Fitzsimmons. They expect 40-50 golfers this year, whereas there have been 30-36 in the past. The older kids will play on Thursday, June 16<sup>th</sup> at Flatirons in Boulder. That tournament is full with

144 golfers and a waiting list. Bob is looking for additional volunteers for check-in and assisting the kids. The Junior Golf Alliance of Colorado included our tournaments on their schedule which helped promote the events, as well as keep other tournaments from being scheduled on the same day. This is the likely factor that resulted in such a spike in participation. There will also be a brand new Junior Golf tournament, which will be in October, the 15<sup>th</sup> and 16<sup>th</sup> at the Green Valley Ranch Golf Club.

The goal of the kids is to qualify for Optimist International Junior Golf Championships at the PGA National Resort in Palm Beach Gardens, FL. This event will be held in late July. There are 26 spots available for the kids, so those who qualify will be very strong golfers. Bob is planning to go to Florida for this International Event for the tenth time.

Ron Cisco let us know that it costs \$20-\$25K to put

on the tournament, with the money coming from entry fees but also from donations and sponsorships from members of this club. Kids who qualify for National get \$1,000 from MSOC to help with airfare and expenses. The title sponsorship for the local tournaments is \$2,500. Also, hole sponsorships are available for \$100/hole. Thirty-four holes are sponsored now, two more openings available (your sponsorship covers both tournaments) which can be paired up with another member/sponsor. See Ron to sign up. You can write the checks to Optimist International Foundation and get tax credit if you get the checks to Greg Young

Joe Marci told us that he has Optimist Day at the Rockies baseball tickets he is selling which also provide support for the program. Joe has 10 seats available for June 12<sup>th</sup> game—Rockies vs. the Padres, after having already sold 100. He hopes the tickets will net \$500 for Junior Golf.

The PGA National Resort Golf course is ranked as the 5<sup>th</sup> best course in Florida, and the kids will play the Championship Course, just like the pros do in the Honda Classic. **Barry Barker** is going as a volunteer again this year. **Joe Marci** and **Ron Cisco** have been to the National Tournament at least 15 years each.
