

# Dianne Tramutola-Lawson

Colorado-CURE State Chapter Leader

Dianne Tramutola-Lawsona, is a volunteer community activist and member of Citizens United for the Rehabilitation of Errants (CURE). CURE was founded in 1975 using a using Texas Post Office mailing address, to which an employee once observed when told what the acronym meant said, "Well, the whole world could join that group." After 10 years in Texas the organization relocated to Washington D.C.

Their new quarters was a small bedroom at St. Aloysius Church that had been inhabited by Father Horace McKenna. The mission

of the Church has been a long tradition of assisting the poor, including prisoners who-having served their sentences struggle to move on with their lives. Colorado-CURE was founded in 1990 and many of the original board are still active today.

Dianne is a lifelong teacher with terms at St. Mary's, TJ, Kennedy, and GW High Schools, teaching French. During the 1960's DPS debatable bussing experiments, she observed and experienced the unanticipated friction between students and community. Since 1990 she has worked as a volunteer and been in touch with all Wardens in the Colorado Correctional System. There are 20,000 prisoners now incarcerated, and murdered past Warden Tom Clemens is missed greatly. Past Director Ari Zavaras, has worked with CURE for 15 years to improve prisoner's conditions and access to half way houses. One of her greatest concerns is the lack of activities for the general prison population including "High Risk" inmates. The DOC Medical budget has been continually cut even as the number of elder inmate's in-

crease. The K-9 program is part of DOC. Prison gangs? DOC has made every "reasonable attempt" to relocate and disperse gang leaders and organizations throughout the system. There is really no solution however. The problem is too large and continues to grow. Colorado does not deport illegal convicted criminals and they end up in the system throughout Colorado. There is also a large number of the mentally ill and geriatric prisoners many in their 80's housed in the system as well. Subsequently there is a great need for additional new half way houses.

Incarcerated Juveniles typical day is structured based on the level of security adjudicated to their situation. Some work, others watch TV others hang out with experienced inmates. More minimum security risk type prisoners need to come out of community corrections into half way houses. Transition prisoner expenses are needed for money owed on restitution and other matters. Judges should have greater discretion in sentencing, a matter the legislature struggles with every Session. The minimum cost per prisoner is \$30,000, which can go higher than \$40,000 for SuperMax inmates. It is the largest budget item in state budget. This brings new meaning to the idea that is easier to build a child than repair and adult. How can we help? Halfway houses and expanded outreach by Churches and community organizations is a good start.

We thank Dianne for the hard work and honesty. Please comeback for a visit anytime.
