
Mile Hi Optimist Club: Mike Chavez asked every-

Mick & Paddy, two Irish mechanical engineers were standing at the base of a flagpole, looking up. A woman walked by and asked what they were doing.


"We're supposed to find the height of the flagpole," said Mick, "but we don't have a ladder."
