Speaker: Dave Whitner

Donlie Smith introduced or Speaker, <u>Dave Whitner, Program Director for the Denver Area Council, Boy Scouts of America</u>. Dave has served the BSA for over 11 years in both New Jersey and Denver. He is an Eagle Scout and Vigil member of the Order of the Arrow. Dave has also served as a General Assistant at the South Pole in Antarctica and as a Facilities Supervisor for the City of Aurora.

Dave is a graduate of CSU and studied in Edinburgh Scotland. He and his wife have two girls, one recently adopted from China. Dave began his adventure in Scouts starting in the 2nd grade and culminated with Troop #457. As a 16 year old he attended a summer camp in Canada and discovered the Swedish Scouts allowed girls. However, there were no other details.

Dave presented a video covering many facets of Scouting that included events held at the State Capitol, and Channel 9 coverage of the 34th Annual Sports Classic Festival honoring MSOC member **Jack Kleinheksel** moderating the Eagle Scout Awards Ceremony.

One compelling past chronicled Scout Tyler Jeffery Hale, rescued two girls trapped and drowning in rapid water. He received the Boy Scouts Honor Medal as a result of his brave and un-selfish action. Dave then shared other examples of bravery and outstanding conduct that assorted Scouts had been involved with over the past years. One compelling story was that of an 8-year old Cub Scout applying his swim training at a pool party to save a girl hurt during a sliding accident.

In 2010, 400 area Boy Scouts attended the Jamboree at Dicks Sporting Goods Stadium celebrating the 100 year

anniversary of BSA. Some of the skills taught at the event were special needs training and leadership at all levels. A Norman Rockwell display featuring Scouting over the years was also part of the Jamboree.

Dave works with Donlie and MSOC members every year at the Annual Eagle Scouts Award Dinner, honoring over 550 Eagle Scouts. To

become an Eagle a young man must perform 177 hours of community service OUTSIDE of normal Scout activities. It has been figured that the Denver area Boy Scouts have contributed over 98,000 hours of community service each year, which equates to over \$2.6 million dollars at just minimum wage level.

Scouts make a difference. Each year in the Denver area over 22,000 Scouts serve in local Packs and Troops. Another 20,000 serve in Non-traditional groups, and 20,000 others serve in Partnership Programs. Nationally BSA has a membership of 2.8 million and there are another 10,000 involved in Colorado Camping programs statewide. In the Fall of 2012 the Denver Council of Boy Scouts will celebrate their own 100th Anniversary. BSA includes women at all levels that has a Venture Scout co-ed program that starts with 14 year old boys and girls. The Pinnacle Award is given to those Scouts who participate in God and Country activities. Dave pointed out MSOC had many Eagle Scouts in the room. Many thanks to Dave Whitner and the work he does with the BSA-Denver Area Council. Please stop by anytime. We love having your spirit and commitment to youth in the room.
