Brent's Place, a group with which Monaco South members have worked on several occasions, is having an open house on Thursday, December 17th.

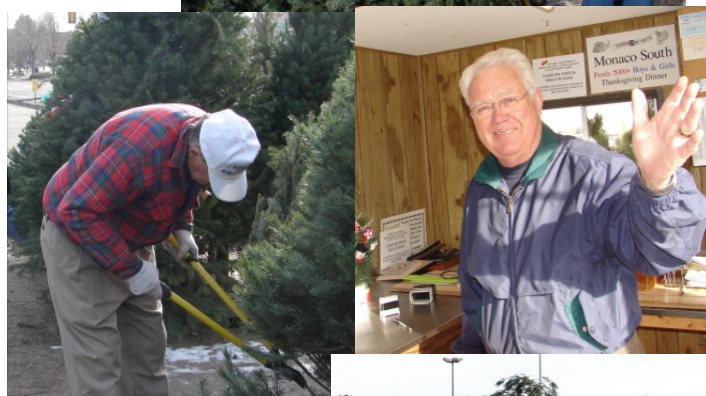

Our Speaker

It Isn't Rocket Science... Or is it? **Tom Mauro** introduced his nephew, Jeff Coyne, who is a real, live rocket scientist. In spite of the fact that he believes, like Tom, that Pueblo is the center of the universe (huh?), he gave a fascinating overview of the Phoenix Lander, whose mission it was to investigate various

aspects of Mars. Jeff mentioned that it took nine months for the trip to Mars, which is 120 million miles from Earth, culminating with "seven minutes of hell," 12,500 mph when entering the atmosphere of Mars, to 5 mph at actual landing. The mission was successful, the appropriate data was gathered and the Phoenix Lander, which was manufactured at the Lockheed Martin plant in Waterton Canyon, now sits on the surface of Mars, frozen in an atmosphere of dry ice (carbon dioxide). Temperatures on Mars range from around 0 degrees to -110. There is only faint hope that the \$90 million Lander will "awaken" after the Martian winter, primarily because of the delicacy of the solar array that provides power for the unit. Jeff was so good that even Freddie admitted that "he appeared to know what he was talking about." We hope to have Jeff back to talk about the Juno project, a mission to Jupiter.

Milestones of Optimist International

- 1911 A new type of civic and service organization, calling itself the "Optimist Club," forms in Buffalo, New York.
- 1919 The first International Convention takes place in Louisville Kentucky with 11 clubs and 1298 members.
- 1922 Members adopt the Optimist Creed and the purposes that guide the organization today (service to youth, community and Optimism).
- 1923 The future course of the organization is set by selecting the motto "Friend of the Delinquent Boy."
- 1924 Motto is revised to "Friend of the Boy." The first Canadian Club charters in Toronto.
- 1928 First International Oratorical contest is conducted. Organization grows to 117 clubs and 8,000 members.
- 1954 Campaign against narcotics peddlers results in Congress passing the 1956 Narcotics Law.
- 1960 A full-fledged campaign against pornography

- reaching school-age children through the family mailbox begins.
- 1963 Octagon Clubs for high school students become an official part of the youth program.
- 1969 50th Anniversary celebration. Board of Directors creates Optimist International Foundation.
