Keith Gallaway and Bob Avery rose early to greet us this Friday the 23rd of January. Did anyone mention that on this day in 1957, machines at the



Wham-O toy company roll out the first batch of their aerodynamic plastic discs-now known to millions of fans all over the world as Frisbees?

The story of the Frisbee began in Bridgeport, Connecticut, where William Frisbie opened the Frisbie Pie Company in 1871. Students from nearby universities would throw the empty pie tins to each other, yelling "Frisbie!" as they let go. In 1948, Walter Frederick Morrison and his partner Warren Franscioni invented a plastic version of the disc called the "Flying Saucer" that could fly further and more accurately than the tin pie plates. After splitting with Franscioni, Morrison made an improved model in 1955 and sold it to the new toy company Wham-O as the "Pluto Platter"--an attempt to cash in on the public craze over space and Unidentified Flying Objects (UFOs).

In 1958, a year after the toy's first release, Wham-O the company behind such top-sellers as the Hula-Hoop, the Super Ball and the Water Wiggle changed its name to the Frisbee disc, misspelling the name of the historic pie company. A company designer, Ed Headrick, patented the design for the modern Frisbee in December 1967, adding a band of raised ridges on the disc's surface-called the Rings—to stabilize flight. By aggressively marketing Frisbee -playing as a new sport, Wham-O sold over 100 million units of its famous toy by 1977. See more @ http://www.whamo.com/history.html.

Origins of Some of Our Strange Customs

- WHY do men's clothes have buttons on the right while women's clothes have buttons on the left? BECAUSE: When buttons were invented, they were very expensive and worn primarily by the rich. Since most people are right-handed, it is easier to push buttons on the right through holes on the left. Because wealthy women were dressed by maids, dressmakers put the buttons on the maid's right! And that's where women's buttons have remained since.
- WHY do ships and aircraft use 'mayday' as their call for ٠ help?

BECAUSE: This comes from the French word m'aidez meaning 'help me' - and is pronounced, approximately, 'mayday.'

- WHY are zero scores in tennis called 'love'? BECAUSE: In France, where tennis became popular, the round zero on the scoreboard looked like an egg and was called 'l'oeuf,' which is French for 'the egg.' When tennis was introduced in the US, Americans (naturally), mispronounced it 'love.'
- WHY do X's at the end of a letter signify kisses? BECAUSE: In the Middle Ages, when many people were unable to read or write, documents were often signed using an X. Kissing the X represented an oath to fulfill obligations specified in the document. The X and the kiss eventually became synonymous.

Mark Hardcastle Author, Restoring Harmony When Your World Is Out of Tune

Author Mark Hardcastle recognized years ago that patterns were developing around events in his life. Good things happened. Bad things happened. Sometimes very good, sometimes very bad. But in the end, everything always seemed to work out. Was that just a matter of chance? Or was it something he could rely on?

After several years of journaling about

that reality, Mark broke his neck in a mountain biking accident near Moab, Utah. An event like that has the effect of powerfully focusing one's attentions. And



now, just over two years later, Mark has written a book about his life experiences and he travels around the country speaking to groups of all sizes about how the Wheel of

Mark graduated from the USAF Academy in 1982. After nine years as a pilot on active duty, he left the military to join a commercial airline. In addition to flying B-777s around the world, Hardcastle invests in real estate and enjoys spending time in the Rocky Mountains and serving on the artistic staff of the Colorado Children's Chorale. He lives in Centennial, Colorado, with his wife and four children. Mark shared with us six main questions which can help you develop the text of your life:

In a world in which I cannot fail:

- \Rightarrow What do I want to do?
- \Rightarrow What do I want to be?
- \Rightarrow What do I want to have?
- \Rightarrow What do I want to give?
- \Rightarrow How do I want to spend my time?
- \Rightarrow With whom do I want to spend my time?
