

TODAYS SPEAKER

John Moser introduced **Buie Seawell**, our speaker today. Buie is a Professor of Business Ethics at the University of Denver's Daniels School of Business. He started his talk on Business Ethics by asking the question: "Can you teach Ethics? A big question! He then said that ethics was not morality as many people think but a discipline. It is the discipline of applying values to human behavior, and yes ethics can be taught. They have been teaching business ethics at the University of Denver for about 35 years.

Buie teaches ethics at three levels: (1) Personal Values (the "bottom line" or outcome based reasoning doesn't work in the most significant aspects of our lives); (2) Professionalism (it's not about pay, time has no equivalent value); and, (3) Corporate Social Responsibility (government cannot solve problems but business's will and have an obligation to do so). Buie gave us examples for all three levels. Very interesting and informative talk!
