

There was a fight on who would introduce our speaker today, since Kendra Black was a fellow TJ High School student along with several in attendance. However, Kendra was finally introduced as the State Co-director for Colorado History Day. Kendra

reminded us all that the program is now called National History Day of Colorado and that each year15, Colorado students participate in the program.

National History Day in Colorado is an academic program for 6th to 12th grade students who create their project as part director for National History of a class, enrichment or, in some cases, as a project independently from their school.

Each year the student's first choose a topic related to the annual theme, then conduct extensive primary and secondary research to gather information, and lastly develop a thesis and present their findings by developing an exhibit, performance, documentary, website, or research paper. These projects are then judged at regional competitions around the state.

The top three regional winners in each division then

move on to the State Contest. The Greater Denver Metro Regional History Day contest is on Saturday, March 17th at Legend High School in Parker. If you are interested in being a judge, please contact Susan Gustin at su-

All judges must go through training the dates for this training are shown on the History Day attachment associated with this weeks GUMS distribution email.

The state competition will be held on Saturday, May 5th on the Auraria Campus in Downtown Denver. And the National History Day competition is held in June. Two State Contest winners from each division go to the University of Maryland to compete against other students from across the nation.
