Donlie Smith introduced our speaker this

morning, Nathan Bale, with the *Boy Scouts of America Denver Area Council.* Nathan began his speech by recognizing those in the audience who had attained the rank of Eagle Scout, noting that only 5% of all scouts had achieved such a distinction. Boy Scouts of America will be celebrating its 100th



anniversary in 2010 and the Denver Council will be celebrating it 100th year in 2012. The reach of scouting has affected millions of children and adults and has members in 230 countries around the world.

Cheerful, Thrifty, Brave, Clean, and Reverent – are the foundation of the Scouting program and valuable words to live by. Scouting builds character and community through a variety of activities including camping, canoeing, hiking, mountain biking, community service projects, and more. These hands-on activities instill a sense of confidence, preparedness, and honor in our kids. Nathan reports that these community service projects supplied an earned benefit of \$1.7 million. The Denver Area Council serves as many kids as the Denver Public Schools and its members could fill Invesco Field.

Scouting programs include Cub Scouts (7–10 year old boys), Boy Scouts (11–17 year old boys), Varsity Scouting (14–17 year old boys), Venturing (14–20 year old boys and girls), and Learning for Life/Exploring (14–20 year old boys and girls). These five diverse programs are specifically geared toward different age groups, interests, abilities, needs, and settings. They programs address character development and instill a sense of confidence, preparedness and honor in our kids.

Today, the Denver Area Council offers nontraditional programs for inner city youth as well as the venturing program designed for young women and men ages 14-20.
