Today's Speaker, Nathan Wilkes

Democrat activist **John Stoffel** introduced Nathan Wilkes who was billed to speak on Health Issues. Actually it was a lecture for Universal Health Care, a very



controversial subject. This editor suggests that future subjects of this nature be in the form of debate, or schedule a speaker for the other side of the question on the following Friday. Mr. Wilkes represented Healthcare For All Colorado, a volunteer-based, non-profit membership organization dedicated

to achieving affordable, undeniable, quality healthcare for every Coloradan.

Nathan's son Thomas Wilkes was born with severe hemophilia, which puts him at risk for major internal bleeding and for which he must receive nearly \$1 million in healthcare costs each year to avoid death or serious disability. The video was made at a Town Hall Meeting, with President Barack Obama, on healthcare reform in Grand Junction, Colorado, on Saturday, August 15, 2009. The story was featured in *The New York Times*.

Admiral Chester Nimitz: Real Leadership and Optimism "Reflections on Pearl Harbor" by Admiral Nimitz Sunday, December 7th, 1941 - Admiral Nimitz was attending a concert in Washington D.C. when he was paged and told there was a phone call for him. It was President Franklin Delano Roosevelt who told the Admiral that he would now be the Commander of the Pacific Fleet. Nimitz flew to Hawaii to assume command, landing at Pearl Harbor on Christmas Eve, 1941. There was such a spirit of despair, dejection and defeat, you would have thought the Japanese had already won the war. On Christmas Day 1941 Nimitz was given a boat tour of the destruction wrought on Pearl Harbor by the Japanese. Big sunken battleships and other Navy vessels cluttered the waters. As the tour boat returned to dock, the young helmsman asked, "Well, Admiral, what do you think after seeing all this destruction?" Admiral Nimitz's reply shocked everyone within the sound of his voice. He said, "The Japanese made three of the biggest mistakes an attack force could ever make, or God was taking care of America." The young helmsman asked, "What do you mean by saying the Japanese made three big mistakes?" Nimitz explained.

Mistake number one: the Japanese attacked on Sunday morning; nine out of ten crewmen of those ships were ashore on leave. If those same ships had been lured to sea and been sunk, we would have lost 38,000 men instead of 3,800.

Mistake number two: when the Japanese saw all those battleships lined in a row, they got so carried away sinking those battleships, they never once bombed our dry docks opposite those ships. If they had destroyed our dry docks, we would have had to tow every one of those ships to California to be repaired. As it is

now, the ships are in shallow water and can be raised. One tug can pull them over to the dry docks, and we can have them repaired and at sea by the time we could have towed them to California. And I already have crews ashore anxious to man those ships.

Mistake number three: every drop of fuel in the Pacific Theater of War is in top-of-the-ground storage tanks five miles away over that hill. One attack plane could have strafed those tanks and destroyed our fuel supply. That's why I say the Japanese made three of the biggest mistakes an attack force could make, or God was taking care of America.

Admiral Nimitz was able to see a silver lining in a situation where everyone else saw only despair and defeatism. Talk about an Optimist! You can find more on Fleet Admiral Chester William Nimitz at: http://www.history.navy.mil/faqs/faq36-4.htm.
