
<u>Tree Lot Update</u>: **Joe Marci** provided a report on weeks activities and shared that this year's tree lot set

#### Smarter Than My Dad

One of my first Christmas memories is when I was about 4 years old. My father told me that Santa's elves were on our roof, and if I looked into the fireplace, maybe I could find candy that they dropped down the chimney. I went over to the fireplace, which fortunately had no fire in it, and there was a piece of candy, wrapped in paper. I was very excited, and peered up into the chimney to see if I could catch sight of the elves. I turned to my dad and said "I can't see anything," and he said "look, they threw some more candy down." And I found more candy in the fireplace. Every 10 seconds or so more would fall into the fireplace, until I had a handful.

Some 30 years later, when I had three little kids of my own, I remembered that Christmas. I thought it would be great to do the same thing for my children. I didn't relish the idea of climbing up two stories on my cold, windy roof and dropping candy into the fireplace, like a neighbor of my Dad's must have. No, that was unsafe and foolhardy. I'm smarter than that, I said to myself, so I pondered the problem for a few days.

What I finally dreamed up was a lot more complicated but a lot more safe than my dad's method. First, I had to make sure my youngest child, Brian, was out of his room for awhile. So my wife, Cindy, got the kids involved in making Christmas cookies downstairs in the kitchen. Brian's room has a window directly over the front door and the concrete sidewalk that leads from the street to the house.

I opened Brian's window and took the screen off of it. I shut the door so the hall light would not show into the room, and I turned off the lights in the room. Then I snuck downstairs and gave Cindy the high sign, and she told the kids that she thought she heard elves on the roof. We didn't count on the fact that kids would immediately start to run upstairs to see if they could hear the elves, too. Cindy was able to head them off and suggested that if they looked outside, maybe they would see candy that the elves might throw from the roof.

Upstairs, standing in a dark room with the cold winter wind whistling in, I could barely hear Cindy. I threw

some candy out the window onto the front walk. The kids came running out of the house, and the first thing they did was look up to see the elves. I jumped back from the window just in time to not be seen. After that, I had to stand far from the window and whip the candy out, making sure that it got out of the window and straight on the to front walk and not into the snow on either side where the kids would get cold and wet retrieving it. I threw some far out to the sidewalk, and as the kids went out to get it, it gave me time to run downstairs so that when they turned around to come back into the house they would see me standing there, as if I had been standing there behind them all along. Then as they looked out the door, waiting for more candy, I snuck back upstairs and threw more out the window.

It was a lot of effort, but it was worth it. The kids had a great time.

A few days later my Dad came for Christmas.

When we were out of earshot of the kids, I told him that I had remembered what he had done all those Christmases ago, and I did the same thing, albeit with a much-improved method, which did not require anyone to be up on the roof in the winter.

"Up on the roof?" my Dad said. "No one was up on the roof. I had the candy in my pocket, and whenever you weren't looking I just tossed a piece in the fireplace. You were
