## Joe Marci Christmas Tree Lot Program Director

Our speaker today was Joe Marci, Christmas Tree Lot overseer provided a detailed update on the TREE LOT OPENING THIS FRIDAY& SATURDAY. Please read carefully and with laser focused attention.

Empirical Data: This is our 37<sup>th</sup> year of operation. Last year we sold 1106 trees, which was the fewest in 10 years going back to 2003 when we sold 1006. The best year for sales was 1999 with 1454 trees sold. Last year we had only 25 selling days and will have the same scenario this year. The 95 members



working 1943 hours in 2014 was a good turnout but we are

striving for 100+ members and additional hours this year. The Tamarac Ladies worked 42 hours, GW High School stu-

dents worked 9 hours and 2 other youth organizations provided 35 working hours. This year MSOC members need to work a minimum of 15-hours to get a discount.

Basic Information: O.C. Larson has provided the layout and John Stoffel is acquiring City Permits. Gary Miller is taking care of electrical needs. There will be an on site generator with its own power panel providing easy to read outlet information. It will run 24/7. New overhead lights that were broken have been replaced at a cost of \$40 each, so please be careful when handling the light poles. District 3 will patrol on a regular basis during the night. Please leave fresh donuts under the trees. There will also be overnight lighting from a parking lot light-pole.

Marketing: Curt Jefferies is mailing 1500 postcards detailing prices, location, product availability, and delivery options. Flyers are being made available to our SC Schools, YMCA and to businesses. You can obtain an ad for distributed, to be placed in your place of work, included in newslet-

ters, etc., from **Bob Finkelmeier**.

**Tree Pricing**: All trees will be pre-priced (with help from the Tamarac ladies), and we will have mistletoe, wreaths, tree freshener, bags and stands, garland, and boughs. Free cookies and popcorn for our customers is also available.

Handling Money: Please collect all Sales Tax. There is a chart on the wall for easy computation. The designated Cashier may never leave his post. Additionally, he needs to be sure a sales ticket is written for every transaction that includes all products purchased. *TIPS belong to the Club*. No money handling by youth volunteers or non-members. Money pickup will be conducted on a regular basis. If a

check is tendered, please get a telephone number and confirm address. Do not forget to give the customer our information package about our club and various projects.

Santa: The Santa Haus will be open Saturday and Sunday from 10 a.m. to 6 p.m. Bryce Slaby shared our friends and supporters from TUFF-SHED will again deliver the Santa House and Craig Eley and Bryce will coordinate decorating.
