#### Speaker, Holly Caldwell, Colorado Center for Nursing Excellence

Paul Bernard introduces our speaker this morning, Holly Caldwell, Associate Dean of Students at Platte College, School of Nursing. Holly speaks to us this morning on the state of Nursing and how it relates to the proposed changes of Health Care Reform. Health care reform legislation recently signed into law will greatly increase the availability of health insurance and broadly impact the delivery of health care in America.

Holly is member of the speakers guild that targets the Nursing sector and how that area can be improved in regard to the care of patients in various settings.

Currently there are over 2 million nurses practicing in our country in hospi- School of Nursing. tals, nursing homes, care facilities and

private institutions. They are the first line of care patients receive and comprise the backbone of the healthcare system. With the changes that have been proposed and are due to be implemented in 2014, this will be affecting both patients and health care workers. Currently some 800,000 Coloradans are without any sort of healthcare coverage with the majority of these being in the 21-24 year old age group and the 31-34 year old age group. These groups of people, who are starting out their adult lives and careers, or starting families are in danger of being negatively affected should a health care incident occur. The main factors that Holly is concerned with are Coverage, Capacity, and Cost as it relates to patients and their health.

Holly mentioned that the health reform law promises to deliver big changes in the U.S. health care system. But, as with other sweeping pieces of legislation, it can be hard to get the real facts about what it does. So she recommended

Holly states that as educators, they are charged with changing the education level of the nursing workforce. She believes that the conditions that nurses have worked in the past will not continue to exist. Along with this are standards of education that the nursing field hopes to implement. It is the Colorado School for Nursing Excellence desire to make 80 percent of the nursing workforce educated with a 4-year degree. This will improve the level of care patients receive and prepare the nurse to be better

care givers. In California, 70 percent of nurses have a 2 year degree so the statistics show there is much improvement to be made in that area.

One aspect of this dilemma is how will the advanced education be funded. Will nurses who are currently working and perhaps married with children, have the financial resources to further their education. In many cases, they will not and in turn rely on grants or scholarship to fund this additional schooling. Nurse practitioners are one sector of higher educated nurses who take more of a holistic approach to health care, and studies support the idea that this improved method leads to more positive outcomes for patients.

With the trend toward to reducing the number of hospital beds available and alternatives to this model of care, the nursing field will have to evolve to adequately care for those in need of care.
