destruction. In one dramatic scene, a fire fighter uses a garden hose, left attached by the home owner, to extinguish a roof fire that had started by flying embers. Steve reports that many alert home owners helped the crews by leaving garden hoses attached, and also that homes built with non-combustible roofing and siding fared better. Estimates put the heat generated by the fire in excess of 1800 degrees in some areas, hot enough to melt aluminum. The use of slurry bombers and helicopters carrying buckets also helped. Steve was impressed by the accuracy they were able to put fire retardant and water to stop the spread of the fire.

It was dramatic and emotional testimony about the strength that mother nature can unleash. It also demonstrated the effectiveness and courage displayed by those working hard to protect us in these emergencies. We applaud their efforts and thank them for their strength and brave efforts.

# Speaker, Steve Schopper, Richie Rexach & Jim Hart Waldo Canyon Fire

Steve Kady introduced our speakers this morning. Steve



Schopper, A/V Specialist & Video Photographer, and Richie Rexach, Paramedic/
Firefighter, both with the Colorado Springs
Fire Department, along with Captain Jim Hart from the Denver Fire Department.
Capt. Hart began by telling how they got the call the late afternoon on June 26<sup>th</sup> to assist with the fire in the northeast part of Colorado Springs. The firefighters from Denver

worked with those from Colorado Springs to assist in the

Mountain Shadows neighborhood. There objective was to save homes, a task that quickly became very difficult in extremely dry conditions with winds that whipped flames out of control at approximately 60 miles per hour. That evening more than 300 homes were destroyed and the devastation was impressive.

Captain Hart's duties during this time was as an assistant to the Colo-

rado Springs Fire Department Chief as they worked to develop a strategy to best fight the fire. It was quickly determined that fire fighters from Denver would work in 14-16 hour shifts and they worked feverishly to establish a defensive line to prevent more loss of homes. The fire was extremely volatile and erratic, Capt. Hart explained trying to video some of the footage and being overwhelmed by the extreme heat his eyes were sore for days after from the exposure. The debris in the air from the fire was also something he was unaccustomed to and was a constant factor that fire fighters were working in during the experience.

He stated that the fire was an incredible experience and one of the rare times he recalls being terrified on the job. As he later recounts, during his video clip the fury and strength of this fire was overwhelming at times and only with the strong decision making direction of members of Colorado Springs Fire Department were more casualties prevented.

Next to speak was Steve Schopper, who tells of the early decision he made to document the events of this fire. He informs the group this morning, that the Waldo Canyon Fire has been 100% contained. As he entered the fire area on the 26<sup>th</sup>, he drew from his experience as a videographer to

try to capture video of the fire from the best angle. He needed to balance that desire with also being safe and not becoming a fire casualty and many times felt the need to pull back despite wanting to film more. He recounts fire fighters setting up lines of protection and saving over 175 homes that were in danger of being destroyed. At the height, over 1,500 fire fighters were involved and it spread to become the largest fire in the world.
