Brent's Place

Paul Bernard reminded us of our commitment, along with the Tamarac Club, on July 26th at Washington Park to provide a pancake breakfast to the runners/walkers in this event to raise funds. Brent's Place is the primary program of the Brent Eley Foundation. Vision: *to make a difference in the lives of children with cancer and their families*. Mission: *help those living with cancer by providing housing and programs through partnerships in our community*.

Linda a Donn Eley established the foundation in 1997 in memory of their son Brent who lost his battle with cancer at the age of 14. They opened Brent's Place in November 1998 to meet the growing need to house kids with cancer and their families traveling to Denver for cancer treatment. Since that time, more than 450 unique kids have stayed here from all over the Rocky Mountain region.

of housing. In particular they need to be protected from common bacteria and molds as well as limit their exposure to other people and inadvertent

infection. Brent's Place is the only place in the region that provides this "safe clean" housing. They currently offer temporary apartments for kids with cancer and their families on a campus of private apartments, all fully furnished and equipped. In

addition, they provide supportive services such as weekly family night dinners, a fully stocked resource center with videos and Internet access, sibling support activities, as well as outings and activities safe for the entire family.

Brent's Place operates two houses, one within walking distance of Presbyterian St. Luke's Rocky Mountain Cancer Center; and the second, since February of this year, near the new Children's Hospital/Anschutz Medical Campus. With the expansion they will now be able to welcome even more children and adults who will benefit from its services.
