year the Club has had few difficulties and lots of opportunities. He thanked all the Club members who "worked to make this Club fun and of service to youth."

Greg noted that over the past year the Club

had spent thousands of hours on over 30 youth-oriented service projects. He related that we have taken in new members. most of whom are under 50. He urged us to foster and mentor these new members SO that they will someday become the leaders of the Club.

The outgoing Board members were thanked for their hard

Die? Not Today

Jeff Carter came to the September 12 Monaco South meeting as **Bill Walters**' guest, but volunteered to fill in and tell us about his

life when the scheduled speaker was a no-show.

Jeff attended the University of Hawaii on a diving scholarship, and hoped to participate in the Olympics. But the United States' 1980 boycott of the Olympics (in response to the Soviet Union invasion of Afghanistan, which Jeff found ironic) dashed those hopes. So he joined the Navy and learned to be a pilot, in the hope of becoming a commercial airline pilot when he got out. But when he left the Navy, the economy was such that the airlines were not hiring pilots.

Jeff took a job with a helicopter company, flying tourists around

the Grand Canyon. Then a call came to assist with a forest fire near Tucson, Arizona. So Jeff went to the site of the fire and was flying supplies to the firefighters when he crashed on the side of a mountain. He and the helicopter debris tumbled a quarter mile down the mountain and came to rest in the middle of the fire that he was fighting. Although Jeff was wearing a fire-proof flight suit, the material was melted by the 3000 degree heat and adhered to his skin in places.

Pulled from the flames by firefighters, Jeff recalls asking one of his rescuers "Am I going to die?" "Oh yeah," the man answered, "but not today."

Jeff was in a coma for two months, during which some of the more painful of the dozens of surgeries he underwent were performed. Major burns on his face resulted in many surgeries just to reconstruct his eyelids, which still do not function properly. Consequently, his vision is blurred, which has ended his flying career.

Now a health insurance agent, Jeff is married with two young children. He is used to children staring at his face and wondering what happened to him, and he is happy to tell them. But he does not let his accident define his life or who he is. To Jeff, the accident is just a

point of time, and he treats it like the ups and downs we all face in life.

Through his church, Jeff has decided to try to help others by raising funds to help a foster mother. The hat was passed at the meeting and Club members contributed \$211. We all felt privileged to have heard Jeff's horrific yet inspirational story.
