#### Walker Stapleton Colorado State Treasurer **Ballot Initiatives**

Introduced by **Frank Middleton**, our speaker today was Walker Stapleton, Colorado State

Treasurer. Walker started his talk by saying that despite Colorado having a constitutional requirement to balance the budget; Colorado does not have a Triple-A Credit Rating. It has only a Double-A rating primarily because it is too easy to change the Colorado Constitution. Some of the ways it might be changed this election cycle include Amendment 69 called "Colorado Care" a single paver health care program covering all Coloradoans. The proposal would make Colorado the first state to opt out of Obama Care.

It was put on the ballot when efforts in Vermont failed to get it implemented there. The primary reason for the failure in Vermont was the consensus opinion that the costs would wreak havoc on that state's economy. The Colorado proposal would raise an employer's tax on his total payroll by 6.67%, an employee's income tax would increase 3.33% and it would impose a 10% tax on all other revenue streams including investment returns, capital gains and pensions. An individual could keep his private health insurance plan and federal health plans such as Veterans benefits and Medicare but they would still be subject to the taxation for Colorado Care. The taxes can be raised as needed without limitation by Tabor. To qualify for coverage, a person would only need a Colorado address. The only reason it is on the ballot is because of the ease in changing the Colorado Constitution. Colorado Care would not be subject to the oversite of any Colorado government agency and once elected, Colorado Care trustees could not be recalled. Walker stated his opposition to this amendment.

He also opposes Amendment 70 increasing the minimum wage from the current \$8.31 per hour to \$12.00 per hour over three years. This is a 44% increase and would drive many small businesses into bankruptcy. This is espe-

Walker Stapleton Continued — and water in large amounts. The law enforcement resources are also limited and can't keep up. Another issue is that people are getting bogus medical marijuana prescriptions because there are no taxes on medical marijuana. He reports that 80% of the 400,000+ prescriptions are written by about a dozen doctors. Walker ended his talk by apologizing for bringing such pessimism to a meeting of Optimists.

cially true in rural Colorado where small business owners just cannot match the increase in the prices of their goods and services. Some have stated that it would be good for the economy because the additional earned income would be spent in the local economy. They forget, however, that it would drive up prices of goods and services. Then other workers will want raises and pretty soon the \$12.00 per hour wage will not be a livable wage. Amendment 71 otherwise called "raise the bar" would make it more difficult to get constitutional amendments on the ballot. It would require 2% of the voters in each state senate district to sign the petitions meaning it would require board support across the state to get an initia-

tive on the ballot. It would also require a 55% approval vote to change the constitution. While he has some reservations about this amendment he is more apt to vote yes on this amendment than on any of the others.

Walker sits on the board of PERA (Public Employee Retirement Act). He has been sounding alarms about the fiscal stability of this agency for years says they have been projecting unrealistic 8% returns on investments when actual returns have been more in the range of 5% to 6%. This has left PERA at only 60% funded currently. If one were to use more realistic projections, PERA would only be 45% funded. Unless this is addressed in the near future, the Colorado tax payer will be in for a rude surprise and hefty tax increases.

Walker also briefly addressed the marijuana issue in Colorado. While the tax revenue has been at about 150 million dollars annually, compared to the state budget of 25 billion dollars, it is but a drop in the bucket. The tax revenue from pot will not be the saving funding that many predicted. The problems keep coming to light like the problems of illegal grows in rural counties where they have very limited resources. The pot grows soak up electricity
