Let's Put Union Station Back on Track!

These were the opening words of our speaker today, Edie Bryan. She is part of a group (The Colorado Rail Passenger Association, or ColoRail) that is filing a lawsuit to halt further development of

the Denver's Union
Station Plan. They claim
the details of the current
plan do not meet the
requirements agreed upon
earlier in the planning
process and fall far too
short of the stated goal to
make the station a "multimodal transit hub of
international significance."

Of primary concern is what they perceive as a lack of connectivity between different modes of transportation and a lack of capacity for future expansion. The existing plan will relocate the light rail tracks about a quarter mile west of the station and does not do anything to integrate the regional transit system with interstate busses like Greyhound. ColoRail views this as unacceptable in light of a stated goal to improve ease of movement between different modes of transit.

Also at issue is a lack of capacity for future rail services, such as a proposed revival of the Pioneer Amtrak route from Seattle to Denver, rail service along the I-25 or I-70 corridors, or private and event trains like the late Winter Park Ski Train. ColoRail claims that if development goes forward as it is currently proposed, transportation opportunities will be squandered without giving full consideration to the possibilities and to the passengers. Union Station is 127 years old; Denver is 150 years old. It replaced three separate venues, hence

Union Station. 1870 – The first train arrived in Denver on June 21, 1870. At that time only four small temporary stations were set up. 1881 – The Union Depot and Railroad Company built the city's first Union Station. It cost \$525,000 and

opened on June 1, 1881. 1894 – The original building burned on March 18, 1894 when a fire ignited the electrical system of the ladies room;



damage was considerable. The wooden tower was destroyed. The building was quickly rebuilt with a stone clock tower. 1906 – The famous Welcome or Mizpah Arch was built in front of the station and formally dedicated on July 4, 1906.

1920s/30s – The glory days of Denver Union Station. During that time the station operated 80 trains a day.
