Toys for God's kids by Phil Perington

A wonderful thing is happening with the CO/WY Optimists. We have been blessed with the opportunity to make toys for delivery to kids who have never had one. In an era where we take so much for granted the realities are that there are millions of kids so poor and without guardians that they have never had a toy. It has always been rocks, sticks, and tin cans.

Toy's for God's kids is changing that reality. They are a non-partisan non-profit organization headed by founder, Merlin Dorhout and staffed by a cadre of volunteers dedicated to bringing a little joy into the lives of less fortunate kids around the world. The program is brilliant in its simplicity. Volunteers from service clubs, retirement communities, physically challenged and devotional community's band together to create and assemble toy cars.

The Classic Car Optimist Club and attendees to the 1st quarter conference can now share with other optimists the exhilarating experience of hands on assembling of toys for under-privileged children around the world. By agreeing to help assemble the cars, merlin and his volunteers deliver boxes of hand produced wooden toy car parts, glue, and hammers. Everyone works together on a "mini car assembly line" and normally produce between 500 and 2000 cars in one session.

The new cars are then boxed up and given to other volunteers for distribution to third world countries across the world, many in central and South America, as gifts to kids who have never a personal toy. The simplicity of the outreach is magnificent and heartwarming in so many ways.

Please look at the pictures and you will see the magic of adult optimist "elves" merrily at work making toys for kids they will never see. However, with every car built you can almost see the smile on that happy child's face. This is a worthy and noble project every optimist can partake in and feel very good about. Jean Lesmeister Leaning CPR

Without breakfast, we went straight to our speaker. Jean Lesmeister shared with us a "gut splitting" presentation before eating a spoonful.

Jean Lesmeister, a good German girl, who is an expert in CPR by anybody's standards. Jean has been doing CPR, First Aid, and Babysitter's Training classes for over 14-years, and is a certified Instructor with three agencies, American Safety and Health Institute, American Heart association, and the American Red Cross.

Jean explained that CPR has evolved over a period of time into a very basic chest compression at 30 times per minute and then two breaths. The goal is to maintain oxygen supply to the brain until 911 responders arrive and the first step should always be for you or someone else to call 911 immediately, before start-

ing CPR. The "Good Samaritan" law protects you, but you should always ask person who is having a problem whether it is okay to touch them, before taking any action.

Jean does training classes for all ages and has a special class for teenage babysitters. Jean does 2-hour training classes at your site and provides all the equipment. All you need to do is line up at least ten people who are willing to pay \$55 to learn this valuable skill. You can read more about Jean on her website at babysit-




