He is the strongest Optimist I have ever met. Tom is a MSOC Friend of Optimists member.

Funny how life gives one perspective...if you had told us 10 years ago that our son was going to spend 20 years in prison we would have been aghast, now we're elated!

What can we say...this has truly been a journey that GOD has had a hand in all along and to so many of our friends that have kept us in prayer...Thank you...it couldn't have been done without you.

We are not out of the woods completely, however, we are very hopeful that this will give this young man another chance at life and we will be able to witness his return to a productive life.
