Speaker for Today

Craig Eley introduced his daughter Laura who spent two years in the Philippines with the Peace Corp. She reported that today was Independence Day for Filipinos—Independence from Spain. She started her presentation by showing a picture of herself receiving a Super Citizen award with her dad by her side. “That was when my dad had hair,” she confided. Elementary teacher training was her assignment, 80 individuals in the total group. That number was divided into 5 regional groups with 15 in each. She was in a group of 3 assigned to a specific town. Elementary schools have as many as 1,100 students, wearing uniforms.

The first year she assisted a 4th grade teacher, 30 in the class. Classrooms are “dismal,” especially as pertains to supplies. Students were instructed in the English language; they were very well behaved. She started a library, supplied by book drives back in the states. Parents were a big part of that. Students were not accustomed to reading for pleasure; she introduced that aspect of reading to the students. MSOC paid for dictionaries.

Laura put up a world map which the students colored by country and did a newsletter. At first she lived with a host family, later in a compound house, feeling very fortunate to have some of the necessities we have. English was taught in the summer between school years, including Scouts. She taught 2nd grade during her second year, during which her parents, Craig and Cindy paid her a visit. Craig was a hit showing off his digital camera and pictures. Some of the items seen: sugar cane, Jeepneys, trikes, karaoke, and nipa huts. Honduras is her next stop, lucky for them!
