

Meet Ken Duffy

New member **Ken Duffy** told us a bit about himself this morning. He was born in Detroit, Michigan into a

family with 8 siblings. He sent much of his childhood in foster care. Ken moved to Colorado once he became an adult and graduated from the University of Colorado in 1980. He has owned his own business for 15 years and is in the industrial adhesive business. His business card states that he is "The Real Glue Man." Dr. Henry Barlow Pervasion of Social Security & Medicare

Our guest speaker this morning was <u>Dr. Henry Barlow</u>. Dr. Barlow spent much of his career in the field of gerontology, the study of aging and its effects on society. He has retired from his career and is now a volunteer member of the National Committee to Preserve Social Security & Medicare. They are an advocacy group working to preserve and expand the Social Security and Medicare programs in Washington D.C.

Dr. Barlow says Social Security is the most successful and broadly supported program in America. Most people do not think of Social Security as an insurance program but

almost one third of benefits paid are for disability or survivor benefits. Currently nearly 60 million people collect some type of benefits from the program. About 71 percent or 43 million beneficiaries are retired workers or are dependents of a retired worker. The remainder is disabled workers and their dependents and survivors of deceased workers.

Social Security is the sole or main source of income for 80 percent of the disability beneficiaries. One of the myths that Dr. Barlow wants to put to bed is that Social Security is a Ponzi scheme. That is not the case as Social Security has a trust fund invested in U.S. Treasury securities. Current projections show the trust funds will be depleted by the year 2034. At that time the projected tax revenue will fund only 79 percent of the projected benefits unless changes are made. The changes must increase revenue and/or cut benefits.

Currently being considered is to raise the revenue by raising or eliminating the cap on taxable wages which is currently set at \$118,500.00 and raising the retirement age from the current age of 65 to age 70. Dr. Barlow emphasizes that the problems to be solved are long term not short term problems but should be address sooner rather than later.
