On This Day in History

On August 28, 1963, on the steps of the Lincoln Memorial in Washington, D.C., the African American civil rights movement reaches its high-water mark when <u>Martin Luther King, Jr.</u>, speaks to about 250,000 people attending the



March on Washington for Jobs and Freedom. The demonstrators–black and white, poor and rich –came together in the nation's capital to demand voting rights and

equal opportunity for African Americans and to appeal for an end to racial segregation and discrimination.

King had used the "I have a dream" theme before, in a handful of stump speeches, but never with the force and effectiveness of that hot August day in Washington. He equated the civil rights movement with the highest and noblest ideals of the American tradition, allowing many to see for the first time the importance and urgency of racial equality. He ended his stirring, 16-minute speech with his vision of the fruit of racial harmony:

"When we allow freedom ring, when we let it ring from every village and every hamlet, from every state and every city, we will be able to speed up that day when all of God's children, black men and white men, Jews and Gentiles, Protestants and Catholics, will be able to join hands and sing in the words of the old Negro spiritual, 'Free at last! Free at last! Thank God Almighty, we are free at last!"

Meet Harry Arkin By Craig Eley

How many people do you know who have been in a plane crash and lived to tell about it? None? Well, if you know new MSOC member Harry Arkin, you now know one.

Harry in 1957, while an Air Force office stationed at Nellis Air Force base in Las Vegas, Nevada, was piloting a small, slow reconnaissance aircraft for the Nevada Civil Air Patrol as a volunteer on a search and rescue mission when his spotter thought he saw a body under a stalled vehicle on a dirt road in the desert. Harry flew low to get a better look, and they confirmed the man they were searching for, an Air Force claims agent, was under the car, probably to get



out of the blazing sun after his car broke down. Harry put the plane down in a nearby field of an abandoned ranch, but what he didn't know was that it had rained the evening before (a rare and unexpected occurrence) and the field was not hard ground but

rather a sea of mud. Upon landing, the plane's wheels sunk in and stuck, and the plane flipped over, leaving Harry and his spotter hanging upside down by their seat belts.

After extricating themselves, they walked over to the car and found the stranded man alive but in bad shape. They had no radio in the plane, so Harry hiked a few miles to where he had seen some cowboys working. They loaned him a horse to ride to civilization, where he called in their location to the Air Force base. What Harry didn't know was that he had some shattered vertebrae in his spine (must have been a pleasant horseback ride). Everyone survived, but to this day Harry is plagued with back pain.

Harry was born in Puerto Rico, where his father, a School of Mines graduate, was the General Manager for the Caribbean for Texaco. Harry had a local woman as a nanny, and so until he was 4½ years old he spoke only Spanish.

Harry's father was on leave from the military during this time, and found Puerto Rico to be kind of rough and tumble. Revolutionaries seeking independence had killed the San Juan police chief, and a \$10,000 bounty had been put on Harry's father by the group. Consequently, Harry's dad carried a Colt .32 automatic pistol, which was of use one even-

ing when he and those in his car were ambushed on the road. A gun battle ensued and they shot their way out of the trap, with neither side suffering casualties. Harry still has the .32 pistol.

At age 4½ Harry's family moved to Chicago, where Harry acquired English in a short time while in kindergarten. During WWII the family moved a number of times, ending up in Denver where the family lived with Harry's grandparents for awhile. Harry attended Morey Middle School and East High, and in 1951 enrolled in the University of Colorado.

Harry had been fascinated with flying ever seen he was six years old, when he saw an air

race between Jimmy Doolittle and Roscoe Turner. He began taking flying lessons while a freshman, and eventually entered the Air Force, retiring from the Air Force Reserve in 1986 as a Colonel.

Along the way, Harry earned a law degree from the University of Denver College of Law and was sworn in as an attorney in 1957. He served as an Air Force Judge Advocate in the U.S., Libya and several European countries.

With a long career in private practice. Harry continues to maintain a law office, handling the arbitration of domestic and international business disputes, as well as wills, trusts, estates and contracts. His wife, Jean, is a member of Tamarac Optimists, and is a former meeting planner for the International Chamber of Commerce (let's hope she doesn't critique any of our meetings!).

In the early 60's Harry was a member of the Industrial Optimist Club of Denver (your author did a cursory Internet search and the last mention of this now-defunct club is in 1974). Harry recalls that the club worked with the Johnson Branch Boy's Club (as it was then known) and, among their other activities, helped the boys build crystal radio sets.

More recently, Harry was a member of another service club, but he dropped his membership after 25 years because he wanted to not merely fund projects, but participate in them. "They had good meetings and good speakers, but you couldn't get your hands dirty," Harry commented.

We look forward to helping Harry get his hands dirty now that he is an Optimist again!
