The award was presented by the Denver Area Council (55,000 youth and 11,000 adult volunteers).

Donlie Smith continued:

Donlie's active, dedicated and outstanding service to youth began in 1974 and continues to this day-40 years.

He was an Assistant Scoutmaster for Troop 143 from 1974 to 1976. For the next 15 years he was Scoutmaster and mentored 38 Scouts to the Eagle Rank. As

Scoutmaster, Donlie led numerous high-adventure canoe and float trips to Canada, Montana and Wyoming.

Fifteen years ago, Donlie conceived, organized and led the first program to formally recognize those Eagle Scouts who had completed outstanding Eagle Scout Leadership Service Projects for the year. Awards are made by the Club to Eagle Scouts for the best service projects in each of seven districts and one for the overall best project in the Denver Area Council. Initially, these awards were presented at an informal Optimist ceremony. Since 2006, the Awards for Outstanding Eagle Scout Service Projects



have been formally presented by the Club President at the Denver Area Council' s annual Eagle Scout Recognition Banquet. Hundreds of new Eagle Scouts, their families and friends attend. This continues to be a very popular recognition.

In our Club, Donlie has been active with the Super Citizen Awards, Thanksgiving Dinner and grocery card sales. For 12 years, Donlie was a mentor for Denver Kids, Inc. for boys from single mother homes.

In 1976, Donlie served, by invitation, as a member of the Colorado Centennial Commission. He developed a special Centennial version of a Ruger revolver for collectors. Thousands were sold. The substantial royalties supported the work of the Commission.
