We also had a brief visit from Marci Elder, Director of Curriculum and Instruction, of the Rocky Mountain School of Expeditionary Learning (RMSEL) asking our assistance in participating on a "Passage Panel" whose goal it is to prompt each student to refle



goal it is to prompt each student to reflect deeply about their work.

During the two days, as panelists examine portfolios, they are able to review student work and celebrate students' achievements in reaching their accomplishments. Portfolios are designed to be accessible to multiple audiences, demonstrate quality of achievements address school and state standards, represent the uniqueness of the individual student and show evidence of reflection and growth over time.

On the first day panelists come to know each student through the work in their portfolio (Reading Day). Panelists generally review three portfolios, make

notes for themselves and the students, and write the students' letters that ask questions to push their thinking and celebrate their accomplishments. The students respond to these comments and may revise portions of their portfolios based on the contents of the letters.

On the second day, students come prepared to present their portfolio and answer any probing questions the panel may have (Presentation Day). The students address the panels' remarks in a time frame of about 45 minutes. The panelists then write a final letter that recognizes that their students have successfully completed the passage process and are outward bound for the next level of their schooling.
