Interesting Geography Trivia

- Alaska More than half of the coastline of the entire United States is in Alaska.
- Amazon The Amazon rain forest produces more than 20% the world's oxygen supply. The Amazon River pushes so much water into the Atlantic Ocean that, more than one hundred miles at sea off the mouth of the river, one can dip fresh water out of the ocean. The volume of water in the Amazon river is greater than the next eight largest rivers in the world combined and three times the flow of all rivers in the United States.
- Antarctica Antarctica is the only land on our planet that is not owned by any country. Ninety percent of the world's ice covers Antarctica. This ice also represents seventy percent of all the fresh water in the world. As strange as it sounds, however, Antarctica is essentially a desert. The average yearly total precipitation is about two inches Although covered with ice (all but 0.4% of it, i.e.), Antarctica is the driest place on the planet, with an absolute humidity lower than the Gobi desert.
- Brazil Brazil got its name from the nut, not the other way around.
- Canada Canada has more lakes than the rest of the world combined. Canada is an Indian word meaning, "Big Village."
- Chicago Next to Warsaw, Chicago has the largest Polish population in the world.
- Detroit Woodward Avenue in Detroit, Michigan, carries the designation M-1, so named because it was the first paved road anywhere.

Program for Today, John Arigoni

Ron Cisco introduces our guest speaker this morning, John Arigoni, President and CEO of the Boys and Girls Clubs of Metro Denver. The Boys and Girls Clubs are fortunate to have the guidance of John. Since 1961, Boys and Girls Clubs have been helping kids from tough neighborhoods stay out of trouble, stay in school, and succeed in life. Ninety percent (90%) of members nationally graduate from high school or earn a General Education Diploma (GED).

John was here to tell us what is happening locally with the clubs. Last year at this time, the country had entered what came to be an economic down turn of historic dimensions. Along with this dramatic fall, charity organizations nation-wide have experienced reductions in donations and gifts. Companies and individuals who have given generously in the past, are now unable to do so. Last year the local Boys and Girls Clubs had budgeted a 25% reduction in revenues. The local organization serves over 9,000 kids and John's mission became to not let these shortfalls affect them. And limiting the kids access to the clubs was also not an option.

The mission of the local Boys and Girls Club of Metro Denver, is to inspire and enable young people, especially those from disadvantaged backgrounds, to realize their full potential as productive, responsible and caring citizens. The organization owns and operates 8 safe neighborhood branches where kids can spend time after school and during the summer. Not just a local hangout, kids come to learn, do homework, develop social skills, express themselves creatively, and participate in sports. With Latino drop out rates near 60%, these branches are needed just as much now as they ever have. Many youth need a safe place to be, a healthy environment where they can see goals like High School graduation and even college become clear and defined.

John was at the Owen Branch recently and was asked by a youngster if he knew what was coming soon. The boy answered that it would be Thanksgiving and then asked, Would there be food again for the kids? It illustrates that these kids look forward to this annual event put on by MSOC club each year. What an impact it makes on them! The Boys and Girls Clubs of Metro Denver will be celebrating their 50th anniversary next year, and the organization is committed to continuing its mission to helping these kids who need its services so desperately. Much of John's satisfaction with his job is seeing the kids come back after succeeding in school and telling of what a huge impact the club made on their life.

In these tough economic times, the club has partnered with 45 other organizations to share resources and become more efficient. They have explored more ideas to make them better at meeting the needs of the community. Each branch has a waiting list of kids who need their help. John finished by thanking Monaco South for its help and involvement with the Boys and Girls club and for sharing our common goals.
