Memorial Day History

Memorial Day is a United States federal holiday observed on the last Monday of May (May 31 in 2011). Origi-



nally proclaimed as <u>Decoration Day</u> in 1868 by General John A. Logan, national commander of The Grand Army of the Republic to honor the dead of both sides of the American Civil War, it was celebrated on May 30 of each year. The alternative name of

"Memorial Day" was first used in 1882, but did not become the official name of the holiday until 1967. In 1968, the United States Congress passed the Uniform Holidays Bill, which moved three holidays from their traditional dates to a specified Monday in order to create a convenient three-day weekend. Many people believe that this action has diminished the importance of the holiday and has decreased the number and extent of celebrations. A number of veteran's organizations advocate returning to a fixed date, although the significance of the date is tenuous. A national moment of remembrance takes place at 3:00 p.m. local time and many people observe this holiday by visiting cemeteries and memorials. Flags are flown at half-staff from dawn to noon on this day and many communities have organizations. which place flags on the gravesites in National Cemeteries. Some Americans view Memorial Day as the unofficial beginning of summer and Labor Day as the end.

Today's Speaker

Our speaker today was our own **Frank Middleton** who talked to us about how to make a tax deductible contribution to Monaco South.

Because our club does not have a 501c3 tax status, we do not get a tax deduction for contributions given directly to Monaco South.

But what we can do are three other ways to contribute to Monaco South and get a tax deduction. They are:
