Weathering Stormy Financial Times

Paul Simon introduced today's speaker and a very pertinent topic, "Weathering Stormy Financial Times." Koren Frost, Division Manager for First Investors, talked about the approach to investing in the current market and strategies on how it relates to our investing goals.

She started by saying she hadn't checked what the financial market did yesterday and hadn't done so today. She mentioned that she doesn't make it a habit to constantly check on what is taking place, but rather she takes a long-term view of what the market does. In the past, when a downturns has taken place it has been followed by rebounds and times of growth. Current market conditions affected by the real estate downturn, foreclosures, high-energy prices, and sluggish economic growth, have contributed to volatile market performance. Similar to the experience of an airplane flying through turbulence, financial fluctuations have a history of leveling out.

Koren went on to say that the more long term your outlook on investing the greater your chances of making money. Over a 10 year timeframe there is a 97% chance of making gains. Her point, if you are having trouble sticking with a financial plan it might be good to contact a professional to map out a strategy and plan accordingly. She stated, "what is right for one person may not be right for you." "Being too conservative can cost you money." An example of this being the small returns many banks yield. Factoring inflation the price of goods in 1977 costing \$100 would now cost \$338 today.

In football terms, savings and insurance can be thought of as a defense. Investments should be considered as the offense. Spread out your investments in different industries is also a good strategy. Consider a diversity of stocks and bonds to compensate for times when one is suffering through a downturn. Those interested in market timing, limited losses, or maximize gains are playing a losing game; simply put, it is mere luck to think this might work!

In down times, it is best to keep investing. You are able to buy more and take advantage of "sales" that can bring you more. Don't let the government compound your losses by taking taxes from accounts being withdrawn on. Take advantage of tax shelters and tax free accounts.

In summary there are no magic tricks when dealing with investments. Take a long-term approach, consider using a professional to help you plan your investments, and consider your personal needs to make an overall strategy for your financial well being.
