Karen Moravek

Community Education Director for Colorado Chapter Alzheimer's Association

Joe Marci introduced this mornings speaker, Ms. Karen Moravek of the Colorado Chapter of the Alzheimer's Association.

Quick Facts:

- Alzheimer's disease is the 6th leading cause of death in the United States.
- \Diamond More than 5 million Americans are living with Alzheimer's.
- Every 67 seconds, someone in the Unit- \Diamond ed States develops Alzheimer's disease.
- Less than half (45 %) of seniors diagnosed with Alzheimer's or their caregivers are aware of the diagnosis.
- Studies indicate that people age 65 and older survive an average of 4 to 8 years after a diagnosis of Alzheimer's disease.
- In 2014, 15.7 million caregivers provided an estimated 17.9 billion hours of unpaid care valued at more than \$217 billion.
- Alzheimer's is the only cause of death among the top 10 in America that cannot be prevented, cured, or even slowed.
- There are approximately 700,000 people dying each year because they have Alzheimer's
- 1 in 3 seniors dies with Alzheimer's or another dementia.

The Colorado chapter raised \$ 1.2 million last year. Already held their first annual event in Boulder, which was major

outreach to people not aware of the organization. There basic focus is on controlling the symptoms at present but no sure vet on how stop the process. Overall, 49 percent of their income comes from fundraising and 32 percent is returned for research, with only 17 percent kept for expenses.

The Colorado Chapter has a 24/7 helpline statewide and calls are accepted at all times. Volunteers answer basic questions most of which concern missing parents, or what do I need to do now that I have been diagnosed with a form of dementia or Alzheimer's. Volunteers also try to coax people into the office to help address multiple family issues. The

Association uses a tremendous amount of volunteers. Everyone should be on the alert for people who look lost or confused.

Karen shared the "10 Warning Signs," see the attachment on the GUMS distribution email. We all need to pay attention, as we get older.

For fear of others noticing symptoms. It is important to exercise, eat right, be active and engaged, plus share your thoughts whenever possible. The Association commenced a prevention class last spring. Among the things stressed is how important a good well-managed diet is in fighting the symptoms of memory loss, dementia, or Alzheimer's.

We all hope Karen will visit us again and share more of her wisdom, insights, and humor.


