- To think well of vourself and to proclaim this fact to the world, not in loud words but in great deeds.
- To live in the faith that the whole world is on your side so long as you are true to the best that is in you.

It would be pure folly to say that every Optimist lives up to the Creed, for that would demand perfection and no man is perfect. Likewise, it would be equally foolish to assert that men who are not Optimists cannot attain a high level of living because they do not have the Creed to

guide them. It may be said with conviction, OPTIMETS however, that every man, Optimist and non-Optimist alike, who has read, considered, remembered and made serious effort to follow the Optimist Creed is a better man for it."

Our Speaker, Paul Gleditsch

Paul Bernard introduced our speaker, our own member Paul Gleditsch, who is the President and Founder of Bring On the Music, an organization dedicated to providing instruments to kids who might not otherwise have the experience of playing an instrument. Paul established this 501(C)(3) (This means you can deduct any contributions from your income tax) organization as a result of his own childhood longing to play the clarinet.

While Paul has established some contacts with people who will repair used instruments at cost, the repairs are still extremely costly. Paul indicated that to this point he has been a "one man band" (no pun intended) and that he could use some help in such areas as: donations of both money and instruments; grant writing; event planning; and providing him with any contacts that might lead to the furtherance of his goals of putting instruments in the hands of

deserving youth.

Currently Paul is focusing efforts for the next few months on middle school instruments for Band and Orchestra so the following instruments would be welcome:

trumpets, clarinets, oboes, saxophone, violin, and violas.
