#### Speaker: Charles Bonniwell Publisher Glendale Cherry Creek Chronicle

**Frank Middleton** introduced our speaker for the day. <u>Charles C. Bonniwell</u> is currently the publisher of the *Glendale Cherry Creek Chronicle*. He is a graduate of Vanderbilt University, received his Juris Doctorate degree from the University of Colorado and holds

a Masters in Taxation from the University of Denver. He has written several books, including *"The History of the Denver Country Club"* and is currently working on *"The History of Glendale."* He has been associated with the *Chronicle* since its founding in 1996.

Mr. Bonniwell talked about the rapid changes in news gathering and the impact on those who report the news and those who receive it from various media outlets. Bonniwell talked about three major trends which have changed the newspaper industry.

First, there is less factual reporting and more opinions in the news media today. Whereas, in the past, there were central reporting agencies (UPI, AP, etc.), which reported a sort of left of center version of the "factual" news for universal consumption, current reporting is based more on opinions and the view is dependent on the source (MSNBC, Fox News, etc.) Bonniwell contends that this is due to the fact that actual reporting of the news costs money and that, because of the "digital news" environment, newspapers can no long support reporters in the field. In the past, classified ads paid for the costs of publishing a newspaper but, with the advent of the internet, this revenue

stream dried up and many print newspapers were forced to cease operation, e.g. *Rocky Mountain News*.

Second, news reporting today is based on the perspective of the individual reporter, not necessarily the facts. According to the speaker, almost all news media

now has a slant, either "Red" or "Blue" and is like living in two separate universes. People tend to pay more attention to the particular program or person who is most in tune with their interests and there is little crossover, thus we become more and more segregated and have less contact with "the other side."

Third, localization of the news, as demonstrated by the success of various local newspapers and the introduction of such instruments as the "*Hub*," a special section of the Denver Post, which is specific to a geographic area, contains infor-

mation only about that area and is written by volunteer "reporters." This type of newspaper requires minimal expense and seems to generate interest among those read it.

The advent of digital news and websites such as Craigslist have contributed greatly to the loss of revenues from classified ads and the subsequent requirement s of newspapers to cut costs. The result is that the many newspaper of today have eliminated much of the staff required to provide timely and factual reporting and have; therefore, decreased the overall quality of the paper.
