This will be an opportunity for Optimist Members to communicate directly with the President and members of the Optimist International staff. There will be seven weekend conferences in all, beginning in October and ending in late November. These conferences will essentially replace the First Quarter District Board meeting, which is normally held in October. Speaker: Don't Hurt Colorado, Amendments 60, 61 & & Proposition 101

John Stoffel introduced our speaker for the day. <u>Phil Fox is a representative of Coloradans For Responsible Reform</u> (<u>http://www.donthurtcolorado.com/</u>), a group that is opposed to the three revenue reform ballot issues, which will be voted on in the upcoming election. Salient points of Mr. Fox's presentation:

- Amendment 60 involves major changes in property tax policies including \$1.2 billion decrease in public school funding
- Amendment 61 places restrictions on government borrowing, including prohibiting borrowing at the State government level
- Proposition 101 reduces several revenue streams, including elimination of specific ownership tax on vehicles, reducing state income tax rates, and elimination of all local and state fees on telecommunications
- 73,000 jobs will be lost if these items are passed
- Class sizes in public schools will more than double; extracurricular activities will cease
- Will cause a "permanent recession" for Colorado economy
- All 34 major Colorado newspapers have come out against these ballot issues
- Over 600 organizations, including Chambers of Commerce, BBB and others recommend voting "no" on these issues
- Nobody seems to know who is behind these ballot issues (Douglas Bruce?)
- Issues are essentially a rebellion against the ever spiraling costs of government and people's perception that government officials are attempting to subvert TABOR (Tax Payer Bill of Rights) legislation, by calling items which are actually taxes by other names, like "fees" or "special assessments"
- In spite of efforts of many groups to quash this movement, there is some likelihood that these measures may be passed by voters who are in a very bad mood

There was some lively discussion after the presentation and, even though most agreed that the ballot issues, as written, were probably not good for the economy of Colorado, many were supportive of the need for fiscal responsibility, both at the state and federal level.
