Treasurer Explains Colorado Finances

The featured speaker at the May 9, 2008 meeting of the Optimist Club of Monaco South was Colorado State Treasurer Cary Kennedy. Finances was not a subject the Club wanted to be reminded of, after all our hopes had been dashed last week when Jimmie Brown made the big score and wiped out the \$310 jackpot (could we all try, just a little, to be just as enthusiastic about Jim's success as we are about our own?). But Cary actually made the subject interesting through her upbeat presentation.

Cary, showing great political instincts, started by exclaiming that Monaco South is "an amazingly impressive organization." Then she touched on the county's economic outlook, quoting economist Paul Krugman, who said "Every other week there's a market I never heard of that has just collapsed."

As Treasurer, Cary has tried to make information about the state's financial condition more accessible by publishing an annual financial report and putting all the state's investment data online at her website.

When asked about highway infrastructure, Cary cited the high percentage of Colorado's bridges that are in need of repair. The gasoline tax, which has traditionally funded transportation, is a fixed number of cents per gallon, and since the advent of the TABOR amendment it has not been able to be raised. Consequently, the fuel tax has not been able to keep up with repair and construction needs. Despite the increase in the cost of gasoline, as drivers cut back on the number of gallons they consume, the amount of fuel tax revenue drops.
